

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A framework for getting it right from the start


It's not every day you prepare a brief for a multi-millionpound new school, health centre or public building.

The sheer size and scale of the project, plus having to engage with multiple stakeholder groups and then fully understand and plan the outcomes the building needs to achieve, can be extremely daunting for anyone, even highly skilled professionals.

Ensuring you and the project team start off on the right path and have a shared vision of what the finished project should seek to deliver, is imperative for success.

To help public sector projects' teams on that journey, the Improving Delivery Team at SFT with the support of architectural practice, Ryder created the <u>Briefing and Evaluation Framework</u>.





The Framework has been developed to support anyone embarking on any form of infrastructure investment to better define, validate and evaluate the outcomes they are seeking to achieve.

And while it's not Statutory Guidance, it does offer a best practice approach to brief planning, stakeholder engagement, development of objectives with a clear link to outcomes and measurement of success.

The Framework has three key stages – Define, Validate and Evaluate – which are broken down into nine steps to use as a guide throughout a particular project.
